[NELLY KORDA COMES UP CLUTCH, CAPTURES SIXTH VICTORY OF 2024 SEASON AT LIBERTY NATIONAL GC](#)

After a 2-over opening nine at Liberty National Golf Club, it looked like a sixth 2024 victory might be out of reach for World No. 1 **Nelly Korda**. But, as she’s done so many other times this season, the now 14-time LPGA Tour winner dug deep and battled forward, outlasting **Hannah Green** by one shot to win her sixth title in her last seven starts at the Mizuho Americas Open.

Korda began the round with a two-shot lead over Green, but the Australian immediately picked up a shot on Korda, making a birdie on the 1st hole to move to 12-under total and one stroke back of the two-time major champion. Korda then stumbled, bogeying the par-3 second hole to drop a shot and sit in a tie with Green at -11. She regained the advantage with a birdie on the 4th hole but tripped up again with a bogey on the next to slip back to 12-under.

While Green stayed steady, Korda made another mistake on the 7th hole, bogeying the par 4 to completely erase the two-shot lead she began the day with. Green only held onto the one-shot lead for a short while, however, as the two-time 2024 LPGA Tour winner made bogey on the 8th hole to open up a three-way tie for first at 11-under alongside Korda and **Ayaka Furue**.

“Yeah, definitely was not a good start to the day. Just couldn't get anything going, and Jay actually told me to pretty much get my head out of my, um, (laughter) and to reset and to start fresh,” said Korda following her final round, “There were opportunities that I could take advantage of on the back nine and it was still a tight race. Even though I was 2-over, I was still tied for the lead, so it's not like I was completely discouraged with my play. Overall, you know, definitely tough start to the day...”

The race to the finish remained in a deadlock, as Korda and Green matched one another shot for shot all the way to the last hole. Heading onto the final hole at -14 after birdies on 10, 13 and 15, it was either player’s trophy to hoist.

“It almost felt like I was back in Vegas at the match play event playing with Hannah. It was definitely a lot of back and forth. I felt like when of us hit it really close or could take advantage of something on the back nine the other hit it close too and made the putt,” Korda said. “Overall, it was just a battle until the 18th hole. You really had to stay really patient out there and trust that -- trust your game and that you're going to hit good shots.”

On the 18th tee, Green pulled her tee shot into the left rough while Korda easily found the fairway. Playing her approach shot first, Green’s second landed in the rough just short of the left greenside bunker, leaving the Aussie a tricky pitch shot that she hit to roughly 15 feet, handing the advantage to Korda.

Korda’s birdie try nearly dropped, and she ultimately tapped in for par, putting the pressure on Green to make her putt to force a playoff. And when Green failed to convert, two-putting for a closing bogey, it was Korda for whom the crowds once again roared on the final green of an LPGA Tour tournament. The 25-year-old emerged victoriously for the sixth time this season at the Mizuho Americas Open.

“Oh, my gosh, six, I can't even really gather myself right now with that, the head-to-head that Hannah and I had pretty much all day,” said Korda. “Wasn't my best stuff out there today but fought really hard on the back nine. It was just amazing to share the stage with Hannah. I consider her a pretty good friend out her, and it was a lot of fun going head-to-head against her.”

With the victory, Korda becomes the first player since **Inbee Park** in 2013 to win six times in a single season and is the first American to do so since **Beth Daniel** won seven titles in 1990. She becomes just the eighth player since 1980 to win six or more times in a year, joining **Betsy King**, **Annika Sorenstam**, **Karrie Webb**, **Lorena Ochoa**, **Yani Tseng**, Daniel and Park. Korda has also tied Sorenstam as the fastest player to win six times in an LPGA Tour season since 1980, doing so in her eighth 2024 start.

Korda earned five consecutive victories earlier this season at the LPGA Drive On Championship, the FIR HILLS SERI PAK Championship, the Ford Championship presented by KCC, the T-Mobile Match Play presented by MGM Rewards and The Chevron Championship. Her winning streak was broken at last week's Cognizant Founders Cup by **Rose Zhang**, who won the Mizuho Americas Open in 2023.

ABOUT THE WINNER

Rolex Rankings No. 1 Nelly Korda

- Korda shot a 1-under 71 on Sunday to win the Mizuho Americas Open
 - Korda held the 54-hole lead after shooting a 7-under 65 on Saturday
 - Korda is the second player to win the Mizuho Americas Open after holding the third-round lead, following **Rose Zhang** who won the inaugural event in 2023
- Korda hit 10 of 14 fairways and 12 of 18 greens with 26 putts during the final round
 - She made four birdies and three bogeys on Sunday
- She set the 72-hole (274) and 54-hole (203) tournament scoring records
 - The previous 72-hole record was 279 and was held by Zhang and **Jennifer Kupcho** after last year's Mizuho Americas Open
 - The previous 54-hole record was 205 set by Zhang in 2023
- With this win, Korda earns her 14th LPGA Tour victory and her sixth win this season
 - She is the first player since **Inbee Park (2013)** to record six wins in a single season
 - Since 1980, seven players have earned six or more wins in a single season including **Betsy King (1989)**, **Annika Sorenstam (1997, 2003)**, **Karrie Webb (1999, 2000)**, **Lorena Ochoa (2006, 2008)**, **Inbee Park (2013)**, **Beth Daniel (1990)**, **Yani Tseng (2011)**
 - Nelly Korda would be the first American player to win at least six times in an LPGA Tour season since Beth Daniel in 1990, who won seven times

- Korda tied Sorenstam as the fastest player to win six times in an LPGA Tour season since 1980
 - Sorenstam earned her sixth win of the 2005 Tour season in her eighth start that year
 - The Mizuho Americas Open is Korda's eighth start of the 2024 season
- Korda surpassed **Stacy Lewis**, **Betty Jameson** and **Rosie Jones** in All-Time LPGA Tour Wins by an American (13) since 1980
- She is now the fourth player to win at least six times in an LPGA Tour season since June 1, joining:
 - **Lorena Ochoa**, 2008; **Louise Suggs**, 1953; **Babe Zaharias**, 1951
- With this win, Korda earned her 17th LPGA Hall of Fame point and seventh this season
 - She earned one point for 11 of her LPGA Tour titles and two for each of her major championship victories
 - She also earned one point for her 2020 Tokyo Olympics gold medal
 - To [qualify for the LPGA HOF](#), LPGA Tour Members must meet a threshold of 27 points
- This is her seventh consecutive top-10 finish on the LPGA Tour
 - She earned five wins in consecutive starts beginning at the LPGA Drive On Championship in Bradenton, and earned a T7 result at last week's Cognizant Founders Cup
 - This is her sixth win in her last seven starts on the LPGA Tour
- This was Korda's first appearance in the Mizuho Americas Open
- This was her eighth start of the 2024 LPGA Tour season
 - She has six wins, a T7 finish and a T14 finish this season
 - She tied the record for most wins in consecutive starts (5) after her win at The Chevron Championship. With her win,
 - She joined **Annika Sorenstam (2004-2005)** and **Nancy Lopez (1978)** in this feat
 - She tied the record (4) for most consecutive Tour wins in scheduled events (won in consecutive starts without skipping an event)
 - She matched the record also set by **Kathy Whitworth (1969)**, **Mickey Wright (1962, 1963)**, **Annika Sorenstam (2001 Welch's Circle K Championship – The Office Depot hosted by Amy Alcott)** and **Lorena Ochoa (2008 Safeway International – Ginn Open)**
 - She became the fastest player to reach \$2 million in single-season earnings in Tour history
- This is Korda's eighth season on the LPGA Tour
 - Korda has recorded the most wins on the LPGA Tour since 2020 with 11 wins, which is two more than **Jin Young Ko** who won five times in 2021
 - Korda has recorded the most wins by an American player on the LPGA Tour since 2020 with 11 wins, seven more than **Lilia Vu** with four wins during this timeframe
 - Korda has recorded the most wins by an American player on the LPGA Tour since 2015 with 14 wins, seven more than **Lexi Thompson** with seven wins during this timeframe
 - She is the defending gold medalist from the 2020 Summer Olympics in Tokyo
 - She is a three-time member of the U.S. Solheim Cup Team (2019, 2021, 2023)
 - She also represented the United States at the 2023 Hanwha LIFEPLUS International Crown

THINGS TO KNOW

- **Hannah Green** finished runner-up at -13
 - She was tied with Korda until the last hole on Sunday until she bogeyed the 18th
 - Green set a new 18-hole tournament scoring record at the Mizuho Americas Open with her third-round 63
 - She also tied the previous 54-hole scoring record of 205, which was set by **Rose Zhang** in 2023, before that record was broken by Korda on Saturday
 - She is T3 for the most birdies throughout the week at 20, preceding **Pajaree Anannarukarn** and **Amy Yang (21)**

- Green has won twice this season already, at the HSBC Women's World Championship and the JM Eagle LA Championship presented by Plastpro
- This was her first start at the Mizuho Americas Open
- This was her eighth start of the 2024 season
 - This is now her third top-10 finish of the season (including her wins)
 - She has missed two cuts, the FIR HILLS SERI PAK Championship and first major, The Chevron Championship

- Four players finished T3 at the Mizuho Americas Open
 - **Chanettee Wannasaen** shot the round of the day with her 7-under 65
 - She began the day T39 after three rounds of 71
 - She went bogey-free on Sunday with five birdies and an eagle
 - This is her best finish of the season and second-best of her career
 - She won the 2023 Portland Classic as a rookie
 - Twelve-time LPGA Tour winner **Ariya Jutanugarn** also finished T3
 - Jutanugarn shot a 2-under 70 on Sunday, moving from T8 to T3
 - She shot three rounds of 70 and a 68 on Friday
 - This is Jutanugarn best finish of the season so far
 - **Jennifer Kupcho** was also T3
 - Kupcho finished runner-up at last year's Mizuho Americas Open after losing in a playoff to Zhang
 - She began the day T5 and shot a 1-under 71 on Sunday
 - This is her second top-10 result this season and fourth since the 2023 Mizuho Americas Open
 - **Gabriela Ruffels** began the day T3 and also finished there
 - She shot even par on Sunday to earn her second consecutive third-place finish and third of the year
 - Ruffels finished third at last week's Cognizant Founders Cup and earned a T3 finish at the FIR HILLS SERI PAK Championship
- There were no players in the field to record more than two rounds in the 60s
- There were three players to go bogey-free on Sunday including **Alison Lee**, **Chanettee Wannasaen** and **Bianca Pagdanganan**
- **Gianna Clemente** won the AJGA portion of the event with 149 points (Stableford Scoring)
 - She recorded a final-round 72 with three birdies, a bogey and a double bogey
 - She won by two points over defending champion **Yana Wilson** and **Anna Huang**
 - Clemente played in the final pairing alongside Korda and Green on Sunday
 - Clemente is a 2026 graduate with two years of eligibility to participate
 - In 2022, Clemente Monday qualified for three consecutive events on the LPGA Tour (CPKC Women's Open, Dana Open, Korger Queen City Championship)
 - She has made four previous starts on the LPGA Tour and has missed the cut in each of them
 - Clemente played in the 2023 Mizuho Americas Open as an AJGA participant and finished sixth

QUOTABLES

Korda on how she saw her idols, Roger Federer and Rafal Nadal, in her game today:

"Definitely way more Nadal today's versus Federer. There was not much grace in my game. There was a lot of the fight out there with it being a head-to-head battle all the way down 18. That's what makes sports so great, that even though you don't have your best stuff you can still grind it out and you feel the adrenaline, you feel all the feelings going down 18. I mean, I felt sick to my stomach coming down 18 because I knew it was a tight battle. We were both tied at the top. It was a tough tee shot coming down 18. Just a tough hole in general. Yeah, I just think that there is no greater thing than to battle it out when you don't have your best stuff."

AJGA winner Gianna Clemente what stood out as she was playing alongside Nelly Korda:

"I think just, again, her composure. I know she didn't play 100% today, but just watching her take it one shot at a time. Again, that is what I was trying to do as well. Just watching that and knowing that I'm trying to do that as well. But to be able to watch it from inside the ropes is a really cool perspective. So just to watch her try to stay patient and just grind out the day, it was really cool to watch."

Hannah Green on her 18th hole:

"Like I knew we both hadn't really holed any putts so I was kind of expecting her to make the one on the last. I didn't actually think I would have a chance to tie her, and I completely miss-read the putt and didn't hit it where I wanted to. To, yeah, make bogey on 18 does suck, but I still have to think about all the shots that I hit really well today and all the putts that kept the momentum and keep me in there."

Yana Wilson on her experience on the AJGA as she completes her final event:

"Yeah, it's been such a fun ride. I'm obviously going to miss it so much. Junior golf has taught me a lot about myself and a lot about my game. I'm just really grateful to have gone through it all with the AJGA. They're such a great organization that ran so many tournaments that I have enjoyed playing over the years. Yeah, I'm kind of sad that it's over now."
