2025 LPGA TOUR PERFORMANCE

Three cuts made in three starts; one win, one additional top-10 finish

OF NOTE

- Earns her 23rd LPGA Tour victory and first since the 2024 Kroger Queen City Championship presented by P&G
- Earns her third LPGA Tour victory in 189 days
- Earns her 113th official top-10 finish on the LPGA Tour
- Earns her third LPGA Tour victory in the continent of Asia and first since the 2022 BMW Ladies Championship
- Won with a 47.5% win probability heading into the final round of the HSBC Women’s World Championship, according to KPMG Predictive Insights
- Passes **Karrie Webb** (\$20,293,105) on the Career Official Money List with the \$360,000 winner’s check (No. 2)
 - Remains \$1,988,588 behind the Career Official Money List leader, **Annika Sorenstam** (\$22,583,693)
- Is the 25th player with 23 or more LPGA Tour victories
 - Becomes one of eight players of the top 25 on the Career Official Wins List to have recorded at least one win in the 2000s
- Won in her 11th appearance at the HSBC Women’s World Championship
- Is playing in her 12th season on the LPGA Tour
 - Is the only active player to be in the LPGA Hall of Fame
 - Earned her 27th and final point to be inducted into the LPGA Hall of Fame with her Gold Medal at the 2024 Paris Olympics
 - Became the Tour’s 35th member inducted and first since **Lorena Ochoa** in 2022
 - Is the first active inductee since **Inbee Park** in 2016
 - Is the first inductee to hail from New Zealand
 - Is the second player from the Australasia region to be inducted into the LPGA Hall of Fame after **Karrie Webb** (Australia) was inducted in 2005
 - Is the youngest player to be inducted into the LPGA Hall of Fame under its current criteria, at 27 years, 3 months and 17 days
 - Webb reached the 27-point threshold at age 25 with her victory at the 2000 U.S. Women’s Open but did not reach the 10-year requirement until age 30 in 2005
 - Has won multiple season-ending awards including:
 - 2024 Heather Farr Perseverance Award
 - 2015, 2022 Rolex Player of the Year
 - 2015, 2022 LPGA Tour season money winner
 - 2021, 2022 Glenna Collett Vare Trophy winner for the season’s lowest scoring average
 - 2014, 2015, 2022 Race to the CME Globe winner
 - 2014 Louise Suggs Rolex Rookie of the Year, the youngest winner in the history of the award
- Is a three-time Olympic medalist, the most of any golfer, man or woman
 - She has earned a silver medal (2016 Rio Olympics), bronze medal (2020 Tokyo Olympics) and gold medal (2024 Paris Olympics)
