COMPETITION HIGHLIGHTS

- Winner: [Jeeno Thitikul](#) earns her fifth career victory at the Mizuho Americas Open
 - She set the 54-hole (202) and the 72-hole (271) scoring records for the Mizuho Americas Open
 - She set the 36-hole scoring record (135) in 2024
 - Bested Nelly Korda's 54- and 72-hole scoring records set in 2024
 - Made just three birdies on Sunday in her final-round 69
 - Thitikul went bogey-free in her final round, her second bogey-free round of the week
 - It is her fourth bogey-free round of 2025
 - She recorded 23 birdies and just five bogeys on the week
 - Led the field in birdies and had the least number of bogeys

- She is the first player from Thailand to win the Mizuho Americas Open
- Was second in the field in greens in regulation (55/72)
- This is her sixth top-10 finish in eight starts in 2025
 - Has 13 top-10 results in her last 15 Official starts on Tour, dating back to August 2024
- The 111th player to win at least five times on the LPGA Tour
 - First player to earn their fifth career victory on Tour since **Ruoning Yin** earned her fifth win at the 2024 Maybank Championship
- Second: [Celine Boutier](#) earned her fifth runner-up finish of her career and first since the 2024 BMW Ladies Championship
 - Boutier recorded 21 birdies, tied for the second-most among the field with **Minjee Lee**
 - She led the field in greens in regulation (56/72) and hit 51/56 fairways (third)
 - This is her third top-10 finish of the 2025 season, and second top-five
 - She finished T5 at the T-Mobile Match Play presented by MGM Rewards
 - This is her best finish at this event (2024, T21 and MC in 2023)
- T3: [Carlota Ciganda](#), [Andrea Lee](#)
 - Ciganda earned her best finish on Tour since the 2024 Ford Championship, also T3
 - She picks up her third top-10 finish of the 2025 season
 - She has finished in the top-10 in three of her last four starts
 - This is her first top-10 finish at the Mizuho Americas Open in three starts
 - T39 in 2024 and T21 in 2023
 - Ciganda finished with 17 birdies and seven bogeys throughout the week
 - Lee earned her second-straight top-10 finish
 - She finished T10 at the Black Desert Championship presented by Greater Zion last week
 - Her T3 finish is her best since the 2022 BMW Ladies Championship
- T5: [Stephanie Kyriacou](#), [Yealimi Noh](#), [Nelly Korda](#)
 - Kyriacou recorded her second-straight top-10 finish of the 2025 season, and her third overall this year
 - It is the first time since joining the Tour in 2022 that she has finished inside the top-10 in back-to-back tournaments
 - She finished T6 at the Black Desert Championship presented by Greater Zion last week
 - This is her second top-10 finish at the Mizuho Americas Open, finished T10 in 2023
 - She recorded 20 birdies, tied for the fifth-most among the field
 - Noh shot an even par score on Sunday, with a birdie, an eagle and three bogeys
 - This is her fourth top-10 finish of the season and second-best finish of the year after her win at the Founders Cup presented by U.S. Virgin Islands
 - She has missed the cut in her past two appearances at the Mizuho Americas Open
 - Defending champion Korda shot a 1-over 73 on Sunday
 - This is her third top-10 finish of the year and second-best result this season, after a runner-up finish at the Hilton Grand Vacations Tournament of Champions
 - This was Korda's fourth title defense of the season
 - Korda led the field in putting this week, with just 106 putts needed
- **Aphrodite Deng** won the AJGA portion of the event, with 140 points in the Stableford scoring format
 - This is Deng's fourth AJGA victory
 - Most recently, she won the Junior Invitational at Sage Valley in March

- She won The Nelly Invitational presented by Chevron in 2024, hosted by Nelly Korda
 - Deng played alongside Korda during the third and fourth round
- AJGA Career highlights:
 - 2023, Junior All-Star Team Member
 - 2x Rolex Junior All-American (2023, 2024)
- **Anna Fang** finished runner up in the AJGA competition and **Lily Peng** finished third

ABOUT THE WINNER

Rolex Rankings No. 2 [Jeeno Thitikul](#)

- Third appearance at Mizuho Americas Open (2024, T7; 2023, T4)
- Eighth start of 2025 season; has made every cut, with one win and five additional top-10 finishes
 - Has not finished worse than T24 in 2025
 - Now leads the 2025 Race to the CME Globe
- With the \$450,000 winner's check, moves from 27th to 25th on the Career Money List with \$10,922,839 in Official Earnings
- Is the first Thai player to win on the LPGA Tour this season
 - The first Thai player to win on Tour since herself at the 2024 CME Group Tour Championship
- The second player from Thailand to win at least five times on Tour, joining **Ariya Jutanugarn**
- First joined LPGA Tour in 2022, when she earned Louise Suggs Rolex Rookie of the Year honors
- Represented Thailand at the 2023 Hanwha LIFEPLUS International Crown (winners) and the 2024 Paris Olympics (T18)
- Won the 2023 Vare Trophy, for the season's low scoring average, and the 2024 Aon Risk Reward Challenge
- Has five wins on the Ladies European Tour
 - Won the LET Order of Merit and Rookie of the Year titles in 2021, following her two wins, three runner-ups and nine additional top-10 finishes
 - The youngest ever Order of Merit winner and the fourth player to win the Rookie of the Year and Order of Merit titles in the same season
- In 2017, won the Ladies European Thailand Championship as an amateur, making her the youngest person ever to win a professional golf tour event at 14 years, four months and 19 days old

QUOTABLE***Jeeno Thitikul (1, -17) on winning her fifth LPGA Tour event at age 22***

“Well, I think when I was a kid wanting to play on the LPGA Tour, I just told my dad, and my dad just told me, winning on the LPGA Tour once, it's good enough. I always tell myself, yeah, actually two. I joined the Tour in 2022 and then get the first win maybe my fifth start from the beginning of the season, and then get my first win was just really a dream come true. But I had no idea I'm going to be this far for sure. I'm just trying to do my part. I'm just trying to improve myself every day. Winning or not, I'm just -- I think the real win that I have, it's all the people around me. If I do my job, either get the win or not really, how many wins that I have, holes in my belt, I just set it down beside me.”

Celine Boutier (2, -13) on the grind of the week playing through different types of conditions

“Yeah, it definitely felt like we were playing a different course every day. It was very interesting as a player just because you have to adapt and you have to think about it instead of just having to play the same course over and over every day, which can get pretty boring at some points. So I feel like this week was pretty exciting. Obviously didn't really want the rain, but it kept it interesting, I suppose.”

Andrea Lee (T3, -12) on what she will take away from this week heading into the off week

“Well, I'm first looking really forward to some time off. I'm going to get a two-week break and take Mexico off and start again at the U.S. Women's Open, which is my favorite event of the year, which I'm really excited to play at Erin Hills. Yeah, just trying to sharpen the edges a little bit, take what worked for me these past couple of weeks and build off of that. I definitely have a lot of confidence going into the Women's Open. Just going to work a little bit and hopefully have another great week.”

Carlota Ciganda (T3, -12) on her week

“Yeah, to be honest, really happy to have four rounds under par. I was playing good, but I don't think I could get those four rounds under par going. On a course like this, it's pretty tough out here, especially the second and the third day, to have four days under par, I think it's pretty good, and really pleased with the week.”
