No. 46 <u>Madelene Sagstrom</u> vs. No. 13 <u>Lauren Coughlin</u>

WITH A WIN

Madelene Sagstrom

- Second career victory on the LPGA Tour and first since 2020 Gainbridge LPGA at Boca Rio
 - 1,897 days since her last victory or 5 years, 2 months and 11 days
- First player from Sweden to win on the LPGA Tour since Linnea Strom (2024 ShopRite LPGA Classic presented by Acer)
- Eighth player from Sweden with two or more victories on the LPGA Tour
- First player from Europe to win on the LPGA Tour since Linnea Strom (2024 ShopRite LPGA Classic presented by Acer)
- The first European winner of the T-Mobile Match Play presented by MGM Rewards
- Seventh different winner on the LPGA Tour in 2025
- Oldest winner on the LPGA Tour in 2025 (32 years, 4 months and 24 days)
- Win in her fourth appearance at the T-Mobile Match Play presented by MGM Rewards
 - o Finished T55 in 2021, T5 in 2022 and T32 in 2024
- Career official money would reach \$4,845,546 with \$300,000 winner's check
- 2025 CME points would amount to 504.200 points

Lauren Coughlin

- Would earn her third career victory over the last two seasons
 - o Her last win came at the 2024 ISPS HANDA Women's Scottish Open
- Third player from the United States to win on Tour this season
 - Joins Yealimi Noh (Founders Cup presented by U.S. Women's Open) and Angel Yin (Honda LPGA Thailand)
- Third player from the United States to win the T-Mobile Match Play presented by MGM Rewards
 - Would join Ally Ewing (2021) and Nelly Korda (2024)
- Would win the T-Mobile Match Play presented by MGM Rewards in her third start
 - Finished T17 in 2023 and T32 last season
- Seventh different player on the LPGA Tour this season
- Would be the oldest winner on Tour this season at 32 years, 6 months and 10 days
 - Would be the oldest winner on Tour since Amy Yang won the 2024 KPMG Women's PGA Championship (34 years, 10 months and 26 days)
- Career official money would reach \$3,368,813 with the \$300,000 winner's check
- 2025 CME points would amount to 707.350 points

NOTABLES ABOUT THE CHAMPIONSHIP MATCH

- The championship match features two players that have never competed for a T-Mobile Match Play presented by MGM Rewards title
 - Sagstrom's best previous finish at the event was T5 in 2022 when she was defeated by Eun-Hee
 Ji in the quarterfinals
 - Coughlin is making her third appearance at T-Mobile Match Play presented by MGM Rewards;
 her best finish is T17 in 2023
- Sagstrom holds a perfect 6-0-0 record going into the championship match
- Coughlin has played No. 18 in each of her six matches this week
- Each player has played more than 100 holes this week heading into the championship match:
 - Sagstrom 104 holes
 - o Coughlin 108 holes
- Each player has played in the Solheim Cup:
 - Sagstrom European Solheim Cup Team (2017, 2021, 2023, 2024)
 - Coughlin United States Solheim Cup Team (2024)
- There are 50 players between Coughlin and Sagstrom and Coughlin in the Rolex Women's Golf Rankings
 - o Coughlin No. 17
 - o Sagstrom No. 67

Semifinal Results:

• Lauren Coughlin def. Ariya Jutanugarn, 1-up

- Coughlin trailed for her entire semifinal match until the 17th hole
 - Her greatest deficit was 3-down on hole 6
- Coughlin won the last three holes to win the semifinal match
 - o A clutch chip on No. 16 left her about a foot for birdie
 - o Two-putt on No. 17 for par while Jutanugarn landed her approach shot short of the green
 - o Close approach shot on No 18 while Jutanugarn landed her approach shot short in the bunker
- Coughlin advances to the championship match in her third appearance at the event
- Through six matches, Coughlin has played 108 holes
 - Each of her six matches this week have gone to 18 holes:
 - R1: 18 holes against Lucy Li
 - R2: 18 holes against Mi Hyang Lee
 - R3: 18 holes against Ina Yoon
 - Playoff for R16: 1 hole against Lucy Li
 - R16: 18 holes against Sei Young Kim
 - QF: 18 holes against Stephanie Kyriacou
 - SF: 18 holes against Ariya Jutanugarn
- Coughlin has won holes 16, 17 and 18 multiple times across her six matches:
 - o R1: Nos. 16, 17
 - o R2: Nos. 16, 17
 - o R3: No. 18
 - o R16: No. 18
 - o QF: No. 17
 - o SF: Nos. 16, 17, 18

Semifinal Results:

Madelene Sagstrom def. Angel Yin, 4 and 2

Of Note:

- Sagstrom led for 15 of the 16 holes she played in her semifinal match and only lost three holes
- Sagstrom played two holes this morning to finish her quarterfinal match against Celine Boutier, beating her in 19 holes
- Sagstrom's largest lead of her match was 5-up through 12 holes
- Sagstrom has only played a full 18 holes three times this week
 - o R1: 18 holes against Patty Tavatanakit
 - o R16: 19 holes against Carlota Ciganda
 - QF: 19 holes against Celine Boutier
- Outside her match with Boutier, Sagstrom has led for the majority of holes in each of her six previous matches

- o R1: led nine holes against Patty Tavatanakit
- o R2: led 14 holes against Minjee Lee
- o R3: led eight holes against Jasmine Suwannapura
- o R16: led 14 holes against Carlota Ciganda
- QF: led two holes against Celine Boutier
- SF: led 16 holes against Angel Yin

QUOTABLES

Lauren Coughlin on coming back from 3-down and the change of tide with her par putt on No. 8 "Yeah, I mean, I kind of got a little bit unlucky with the plugged lie, but I was just trying to get myself a putt at it. Been putting really well all week, so I just knew I just needed to get a putt. As soon as I hit it I kind of knew I hit a pretty good putt. Obviously anything can happen in match play, and so when she missed I think that just kind of -- the momentum definitely shifted a little bit."

Lauren Coughlin on her emotions through the last six holes of her semifinal match

"Yeah, again, I just felt like I was playing really well all day today. Ariya just didn't seem to make very many mistakes there to start. She made a lot of really good putts for par and hit it really close on the first hole. I just kind of hung in there. This course is super tough and you kind of have to miss in a lot of the really good places. If not, you can have some really difficult chips, up and downs. I feel like my caddie and I have done a really good job managing that, especially coming down the stretch the last few holes. I've been lucky that 17 has been a really good number for me all week. I'm not fighting between clubs, because it's a really small green. And, yeah, I think I've just started to get into a groove and just get really focused there towards the end. I've just gotten everything seemed to go my way there at the end."

Madelene Sagstrom on how much she enjoys match play

"I mean, you're never out of it. That's the thing. I think there is so much fun because even though this golf course is so difficult -- you can hit a bad golf shot -- like I have to hole on 6. Like I was out and I hit this shot and I'm like, what just happened? But you're never out of a hole or out of a match. I think that's the charm of it. Like you can just keep going and keep going."

Madelene Sagstrom on finishing her quarterfinal match this morning and heading into the semifinal match "We were talking about it last night because I had to sit and wait for them to finish their marathon of a playoff. I was like, do I want to be in their shoes or do I want to be in my shoes. You never know. This morning I definitely felt like I was awake. I had already warmed up. I was ready to go out again, so I probably think it was a little bit of an advantage. I felt the greens a little bit, so it was good."
