

2025 LPGA Tour Storylines

- The LPGA Tour will commemorate its 75th anniversary season throughout 2025, celebrating its legacy as the world's longest-running women's professional sports organization
- The 2025 LPGA Tour schedule features 32 official events in 12 different countries and 14 different states in the U.S.
 - Two new events the Black Desert Championship and MEXICO Riviera Maya Open at Mayakoba – are featured in 2025
 - Players will compete in the first annual Black Desert Championship at the Black Desert Resort's signature course, and will be accommodated with the only private charters at a domestic event on the LPGA Tour
 - The LPGA Tour returns to Mexico for the first time since 2017 for the MEXICO Riviera Maya Open at Mayakoba, at Mayakoba's El Camaleón Course
 - Players will compete for a historic prize fund of almost \$130 million in 2025
 - This is the largest prize fund in the Tour's history and a 90% increase from 2021
- The 2025 major championship venues include:
 - The Club at Carlton Woods in The Woodlands, Texas (The Chevron Championship)
 - o Erin Hills in Erin, Wisc. (U.S. Women's Open)
 - o Fields Ranch East at PGA Frisco in Frisco, Texas (KPMG Women's PGA Championship)
 - Evian Resort Golf Club in Evian-les-Bains, France (Amundi Evian Championship)
 - o Royal Porthcawl in Wales, United Kingdom (AIG Women's Open)
- The Hanwha LIFEPLUS International Crown returned in 2025, taking place at New Korea Country Club in Goyang, Republic of Korea
 - The bi-annual team match-play event features eight teams, represented by four athletes each, all competing for the coveted crown
 - The 2025 competition will include a World Team made up of the top-ranked player from each of the following four regions, not from a country already qualified: Americas (North America and South America); Europe; Asia; and Africa and Oceania
 - The last edition of the event took place in 2023 at TPC Harding Park in San Francisco where the Thailand Team of Ariya Jutanugarn, Moriya Jutanugarn, Patty Tavatanakit and Jeeno Thitikul claimed the crown
 - o In 2025, the Australian Team of Minjee Lee, Hannah Green, Grace Kim, and Steph Kyriacou claimed the crown defeating the United Staes in the Championship Match
- The schedule includes the third annual Grant Thornton Invitational, where the 32-player field comprised of 16 LPGA Tour and 16 PGA TOUR professionals compete for a combined \$4 million purse (\$2 million each Tour)
 - o Former UCLA athletes Patty Tavatanakit and Jake Knapp won the second edition of the event at Tiburon Golf Club in Naples, Fla.
- There are 22 LPGA Tour rookies in 2025, representing 12 different countries (including the U.S.)
- There are 15 players on the LPGA Tour that earned status for the 2025 season through competing on the Epson Tour in 2024
 - The top-10 finishers (Lauren Stephenson, Yahui Zhang, Fatima Fernandez Cano, Jessica Porvasnik, Brooke Matthews, Ingrid Lindblad, Jenny Bae, Fiona Xu, Madison Young and Cassie Porter) will serve as 2025 Epson Tour Ambassadors
- The 2025 season features several season-long competitions including:



- Race to the CME Globe: a season-long points competition in which LPGA Members accumulate points in every Official LPGA Tournament to gain entry into the seasonending CME Group Tour Championship, where they will compete for an \$11 million purse
 - The \$4 million winner's check at the CME Group Tour Championship is the largest first-place prize in the history of women's golf
- Aon Risk Reward Challenge: a unique, season-long competition that highlights the game's best players as they navigate some of the most strategically challenging holes
 - The player at the top of the Aon leaderboard at the end of the regular season will receive \$1 million
 - Jeeno Thitikul (2024), Angel Yin (2023), Minjee Lee (2022), Hannah Green (2021) and Carlota Ciganda (2019) are past winners of the Aon Risk Reward Challenge
- Rolex Player of the Year: an award given to the player that has the most consistent and outstanding record during the current LPGA Tour season, with points awarded to Members finishing in the top 10 and ties in Official Tournaments
- <u>Vare Trophy</u>: an award given to the player on Tour with the lowest overall scoring average based on the Member's total yearly score in Official Tournaments divided by the number of official rounds she played during a season
- o <u>Louise Suggs Rolex Rookie of the Year</u>: an award given to the first-year Member who scores the most points based on finish position at Official Tournaments during a season
- Rolex Annika Major Award: an award given to the player who has the most outstanding record in all five major championships during the LPGA Tour season

2025 LPGA Tournament Recaps

Hilton Grand Vacations Tournament of Champions (Jan. 30 – Feb. 2) Lake Nona Golf & Country Club in Lake Nona, Fla.

Purse: \$2 million

Winner: A Lim Kim (-20)

- Shot all four rounds in the 60s (65-69-67-67)
 - o Only player in the field to do so
 - o On last instance, won the 2024 LOTTE Championship presented by Hoakalei
- Tied career-low 72-hole score with 268
- Won wire-to-wire for the second time in her career
 - o She won wire-to-wire with ties at the 2024 LOTTE Championship presented by Hoakalei
 - o First player since **Hyo Joo Kim** in 2023 to win wire-to-wire without ties

Founders Cup presented by U.S. Virgin Islands (Feb. 6-9)

Bradenton Country Club in Bradenton, Fla.

Purse: \$2 million

Winner: Yealimi Noh (-21)

- First Rolex First-Time Winner since A Lim Kim won the 2024 LOTTE Championship presented by Hoakalei
- Noh's four-shot margin of victory over Jin Young Ko is just one off the record for the Founders Cup



- o Inbee Kim (2018) and Sei Young Kim (2016) each won by five strokes
- Set the 54-hole and 72-hole scoring record at Bradenton Country Club
 - Also tied 54-hole Founders Cup scoring record on first set in 2017 by Anna Nordqvist at Wildfire Golf Club in Phoenix, Arizona
- Is the 207th American to win at least once on the LPGA Tour

Honda LPGA Thailand (Feb. 20-23)

Siam Country Club (Old Course) in Pattaya, Chonburi, Thailand

Purse: \$1.7 million Winner: Angel Yin (-28)

- Earned her second LPGA Tour career victory and first since 2023 Buick LPGA Shanghai
- Recorded the lowest 72-hole score in relation to par (-28) on the LPGA Tour since Lydia Ko at the 2021 LOTTE Championship
- Broke the 72-hole and tied the 54-hole tournament scoring records
- Shot her lowest 72-hole score (260), 54-hole score (195), 36-hole score (131)
- Tied her lowest 18-hole score (64, R1 and R2)

HSBC Women's World Championship (Feb. 27-Mar. 2)

Sentosa Golf Club (Tanjong) in Singapore

Purse: \$2.4 million Winner: Lydia Ko (-13)

- Earned her 23rd LPGA Tour career victory and first since the 2024 Kroger Queen City Championship presented by P&G
- Earned her third LPGA Tour victory in 189 days
- Earns her third LPGA Tour victory in the continent of Asia and first since the 2022 BMW Ladies Championship
- Passed Karrie Webb on the Career Official Money List with the \$360,000 winner's check
 - o Remains \$1,988,588 behind the Career Official Money List leader, Annika Sorenstam
- Is the 25th player with 23 or more LPGA Tour victories
 - Becomes one of eight players of the top 25 on the Career Official Wins List to have recorded at least one win in the 2000s

Blue Bay LPGA (March 6-9)

Jian Lake Blue Bay Golf Course in China

Purse: \$2.5 million

Winner: Rio Takeda (-17)

- Became the Tour's second Rolex First-Time Winner of 2025
- Became the third-straight player to become a Rolex First-Time Winner at the Blue Bay LPGA
- First rookie to win on Tour since Haeran Ryu won the 2023 Walmart NW Arkansas Championship
- Recorded the largest margin of victory at the Blue Bay LPGA, six strokes
- Was the only player to record all four rounds in the 60s



Ford Championship presented by Wild Horse Pass (March 27-30) Whirlwind Golf Club, Cattail Course in Phoenix, Arizona

Purse: \$2.25 million Winner: Hyo Joo Kim (-22)

- Seventh career victory and first since 2023 Ascendant LPGA benefiting Volunteers of America
- Sixth different winner on Tour this season
- Second player from the Republic of Korea to win this season, joining **A Lim Kim** (Hilton Grand Vacations Tournament of Champions)
- Tenth different player from the Republic of Korea to win at least seven ties on Tour, joining Sung Hyun Park (7), In-Kyung Kim (7), Mi Hyun (8), Na Yeon Choi (9), Jiyai Shin (11), Sei Young Kim (12), Jin Young Ko (15), Inbee Park (21) and Seri Pak (25)

T-Mobile Match Play presented by MGM Rewards (April 2-6)

Shadow Creek Golf Course in Las Vegas

Purse: \$2 million

Winner: Madelene Sagstrom

- Defeated Lauren Coughlin 1-up in the championship match
- Second career victory on the LPGA Tour and first since 2020 Gainbridge LPGA at Boca Rio
 - o 1,897 days since her last victory or 5 years, 2 months and 11 days
- The only winner of the T-Mobile Match Play presented by MGM Rewards to finish with a perfect 7-0-0 record
 - o 2024 winner **Nelly Korda** only won three match play matches due to a change in format
- Eighth player from Sweden with two or more victories on the LPGA Tour joining Carin Koch (2), Maria Hjorth (5), Sophie Gustafson (5), Helen Alfredsson (7), Anna Nordqvist (9), Liselotte Neumann (13) and Annika Sorenstam (72)

JM Eagle LA Championship presented by Plastpro El Caballero Country Club in Los Angeles

Purse: \$3.75 million

Winner: Ingrid Lindblad (-21)

- Lindblad became a Rolex First-Time Winner in just her third start on the LPGA Tour, defeating fellow rookie Akie Iwai by one stroke
- Set a 72-hole tournament scoring record with her four-day 267, and holds a share of the 18-hole tournament scoring record with a 9-under 63 shot in the second round
- Is the third Rolex First-Time Winner of the season, joining Rio Taked and Yealimi Noh, and the second rookie to win in 2025, after Takeda
- Is the second consecutive Swede to win on Tour this season, following Madelene Sagstrom, and the second consecutive Swede to win at El Caballero CC, following Annika Sorenstam

The Chevron Championship

The Club at Carlton Woods in The Woodlands, Texas

Purse: \$8 million

Winner: Mao Saigo (-7)



- Won in a five-way playoff, the largest in LPGA Tour Major Championship victory, with a birdie on the first playoff hole
- Is the first player from Japan to win The Chevron Championship
- Fifth player from Japan to win a major championship victory and first since **Ayaka Furue** at the 2024 Amundi Evian Championship
- Fourth 2025 Rolex First-Time Winner, joining Noh (Founders Cup presented by U.S. Virgin Islands), Takeda (Blue Bay LPGA) and Lindblad (JM Eagle LA Championship presented by Plastpro)

Black Desert Championship presented by Greater Zion Black Desert Resort in Ivins, Utah

Purse: \$3 million

Winner: Haeran Ryu (-26)

- Earned her third career LPGA Tour victory and first since the 2024 FM Championship
- Won her first LPGA Tour event wire-to-wire
 - Second wire-to-wire winner with no ties this season and first since A Lim Kim at the 2025 Hilton Grand Vacations Tournament of Champions
- Broke her 72-hole scoring record by three strokes, previously 265 at the 2024 Dana Open
- Becomes the 23rd different player from the Republic of Korea with three or more wins on the LPGA Tour
- The second time she won an inaugural event following the 2024 FM Championship

Mizuho Americas Open

Liberty National Golf Club in Jersey City, New jersey

Purse: \$3 million

Winner: Jeeno Thitikul (-17)

- Thitikul earned her fifth LPGA Tour victory, defeating Celine Boutier by four strokes at Liberty National Golf Club
- Earned her sixth top-10 finish in eight starts in 2025 and 13th top-10 result in her last 15 Official starts on Tour, dating back to August 2024
- Was her third consecutive top-10 finish at Liberty National Golf Club (2024 T7; 2023 T10)
- She set the 54-hole (202) and the 72-hole (271) scoring records for the Mizuho Americas Open
 - She also holds the 36-hole scoring record (135), set in 2024

MEXICO Riviera Maya Open at Mayakoba El Camaleón Golf Course at Mayakoba

Purse: \$2.5 million

Winner: Chisato Iwai (-12)

- Iwai became the fifth Rolex First-Time Winner earning her first LPGA Tour victory
- The third rookie to win on Tour this season
 - This is the first time since 2015 that three rookies have won on Tour before the end of May
- Won on the LPGA Tour in her fifth start
- Won the inaugural MEXICO Riviera Maya Open at Mayakoba



 First player in seven years to get her first career LPGA Tour victory with a margin of six strokes or more

U.S. Women's Open presented by Ally

Erin Hills Golf Course
Purse: \$12 million
Winner: Maja Stark (-7)

- Won her first major championship
- Is the sixth major champion from Sweden and the third to win a U.S. Women's Open
 - o Joined Liselotte Neumann (1988) and Annika Sorenstam (2006, 1996, 1995)
- Is the first European to win the U.S. Women's Open since Sorenstam won in 2006
- Became the 11th different major champion on the LPGA Tour since Allisen Corpuz won the 2023 U.S. Women's Open presented by Ally

ShopRite LPGA Classic presented by Acer

Seaview, Bay Course Purse: \$1.75 million

Winner: Jennifer Kupcho (-15)

- Earns her fourth LPGA Tour victory and first since the 2022 Dow Championship
- Becomes the 80th American to win at least four times on the LPGA Tour
- Is the 16th different player from the United States to win the ShopRite LPGA Classic and first since **Lexi Thompson** in 2019
- Becomes the 14th different player to win on the LPGA Tour in 2025

Meijer LPGA Classic for Simply Give

Blythefield Country Club

Purse: \$3 million

Winner: Carlota Ciganda (-16)

- Her third career victory and first since the 2016 Citi Banamex Lorena Ochoa Invitational
 - o It has been 3,136 days or 8 years, 7 months and 2 days since her last victory
- Joins Beatriz Recari as the winningest LPGA Tour player from Spain with three victories
- The oldest player to win on the LPGA Tour since **Eun-Hee Ji** won the 2022 T-Mobile Match Play presented by MGM Rewards at 36 years and 16 days of age
- Is the second European to win the Meijer LPGA Classic for Simply Give, following **Leona Maguire** (2023)

KPMG Women's PGA Championship

Fields Ranch East at PGA Frisco

Purse: \$12 million Winner: Minjee Lee (-5)

- Earns her 11th career victory on the LPGA Tour, and first since the 2023 BMW Ladies Championship
- With the \$1,800,000 winner's check, moved from seventh to sixth on the Career Money List with \$17,356,213 in Official Earnings
- The first Australian to win the KPMG Women's PGA Championship since Hannah Green in 2019



- The third Australian to win three or more major championships, joining Karrie Webb and Jan Stephenson
- Becomes the 31st player in LPGA Tour history to win three or more major championships
- First Australian player to win on the LPGA Tour since **Hannah Green** at the 2024 BMW Ladies Championship

Dow Championship Midland Country Club Purse: \$3.3 million

Winners: Jin Hee Im & Somi Lee (-20)

- Both became Rolex First-Time Winners at the Dow Championship
 - o First duo to both become Rolex First-Time Winners at the event
- Are the 50th and 51st players from the Republic of Korea to win on the LPGA Tour
- First players from the Republic of Korea to win the Dow Championship
- Im surpassed the \$2 million mark in Official Career Earnings with the winner's check (\$2,267,751)
- Lee passed the \$1 million mark in Official Career Earnings with the winner's check (\$1,257,035)

The Amundi Evian Championship Evian Resort Golf Club

Purse: \$8 million

Winner: Grace Kim (-14)

- Won her first major championship and the third consecutive player to make The Amundi Evian Championship their first major championship
 - o Second career victory
- The third player to win The Amundi Evian Championship in a playoff since its major elevation in 2013
 - o Joins Minjee Lee (2021) and Anna Nordqvist (2017)
- Second Aussie to win the major championship, joining Lee in 2021
- 10th player from Australia to win at least twice on the LPGA Tour
- 19th different Tour winner through 18 events this season

ISPS HANDA Women's Scottish Open

Dundonald Links Purse: \$2 million

Winner: Lottie Woad (-21)

- Became the third player to win in their first start on the LPGA Tour as an LPGA Tour Member
 - Joined Jin Young Ko (2018 ISPS Handa Women's Australian Open) and Beverly Hanson (1951 Eastern Open)
- Became the ninth player to win in their first professional start in an official LPGA Tour event since 1980
 - The first since Rose Zhang in 2023 who won the Mizuho Americas Open as a nonmember
- Is the first English player to win on Tour since Jodi Ewart Shadoff won the 2022 LPGA MEDIHEAL Championship



Tied the 72-hole tournament scoring record at Dundonald Links with her winning 267

AIG Women's Open Royal Porthcawl Golf Course

Purse: \$9.75 million

Winner: Miyu Yamashita (-11)

- The sixth player to become a Rolex First-Time winner at the AIG Women's Open
 - First player since Ashleigh Buhai in 2022
- The 12th player to make the AIG Women's Open their first major championship victory
- Becomes the second player from Japan to win the AIG Women's Open
 - o Joins Hinako Shibuno in 2019 who won as a non-member
- The sixth player from Japan to win a major championship
 - The fourth different Japanese player to win a LPGA Tour major championship in the last two years

The Standard Portland Classic Columbia Edgewater Country Club

Purse: \$3 million Winner: Akie Iwai (-24)

- Wins in her first start at The Standard Portland Classic to become a Rolex First Time Winner
- Becomes the 10th Rolex First-Time Winner this season and third consecutive player to become a Rolex First Time Winner
- The sixth rookie to win on the LPGA Tour this season following her sister, Chisato Iwai (MEXICO Riviera Maya Open at Mayakoba), Ingrid Lindblad (JM Eagle LA Championship presented by Plastpro), Rio Takeda (Blue Bay LPGA), Lottie Woad (ISPS Handa Women's Scottish Open) and Miyu Yamashita (AIG Women's Open)
- Along with sister Chisato, is the fourth set of sisters to win on the LPGA Tour including Jessica and Nelly Korda, Ariya and Moriya Jutanugarn, and Annika and Charlotta Sorenstam

CPKC Women's Open

Mississaugua Golf and Country Club

Purse: \$2.75 million

Winner: Brooke Henderson (-15)

- Earned her 14th victory on the LPGA Tour and first since the 2023 Hilton Grand Vacations Tournament of Champions
- 42nd player with 14 or more victories on the LPGA Tour
- Remains the winningest Canadian golfer, male or female, with 14 victories
- Became the first non-U.S. player to win in their native country since Ruoning Yin won the 2024
 Buick LPGA Shanghai in the People's Republic of China
- Sixth player to win the CPKC Women's Open two or more times since 1975
 - o Previously won this event in 2018
- Fourth Canadian to have won their national open twice and first since 1914
 - o Three men have won the Canadian Open twice: Charles Murray, Albert Murray, Karl Keffer



FM Championship TPC Boston Purse: \$4.1 million

Winner: Miranda Wang (-20)

- Became a Rolex First Time Winner
- Became the seventh 2025 LPGA Tour rookie to win this season, joining Rio Takeda (Blue Bay LPGA), Akie Iwai (The Standard Portland Classic), Chisato Iwai (MEXICO Riviera Maya Open at Mayakoba), Miyu Yamashita (AIG Women's Open), Ingrid Lindblad (JM Eagle LA Championship presented by Plastpro) and Lottie Woad (ISPS Handa Women's Scottish Open)
 - o This marks the most rookies to win in a single LPGA Tour season since 1980
 - o Ties the most wins by rookies in a single LPGA Tour season since 2009
- Became the 24th different winner on the LPGA Tour in 2025 through 23 events
- Surpassed the \$1 million mark in official career winnings with the \$615,000 winner's check
- Became the first winner from the People's Republic of China on the LPGA Tour since Ruoning
 Yin at the 2024 Maybank Championship
- Became the fourth member of the Duke University women's golf team to win on the LPGA Tour, joining Celine Boutier, Brittany Lang and Leona Maguire

Kroger Queen City Championship presented by P&G

TPC River's Bend Purse: \$2 million

Winner: Charley Hull (-20)

- Earns her third career victory and her first since the 2022 Ascendant LPGA Benefiting Volunteers of America
 - 1,077 days since her last victory on Tour
- The fourth player from England to win at least three times on the LPGA Tour
- Wins in her third start at the Kroger Queen City Championship presented by P&G
 - Finished runner-up in 2023 at Kenwood Country Club
- She finished in the top-six in multiple statistical categories including:

Birdies: 22, T4Bogeys: 4, T2Putts: 106, T6

Became the 25th different winner on the LPGA Tour in 2025 through 24 events

Walmart NW Arkansas Championship presented by P&G Pinnacle Country Club

Purse: \$3 million

- Shortened to 18 holes after dangerous conditions caused the golf course to be unplayable
- Was not an official event; therefore, no Race to CME Globe points or award points were given
- Two million dollars in prize money was paid out from the tournament purse
 - \$1.5 million (50% of the original purse) was distributed under the standard LPGA purse distribution method to the top 65 and ties



 The remaining \$500,000 was divided evenly among all 144 players in the field, with each receiving \$3,500

LOTTE Championship presented by Hoakalei

Hoakalei Country Club Purse: \$3 million

Winner: Youmin Hwang (-17)

- Member of the KLPGA, became eligible for LPGA Membership with this win but chose to defer to the 2026 season
- Became the sixth different Korean player to win on the LPGA Tour this season, joining Jin Hee
 Im, A Lim Kim, Hyo Joo Kim, Somi Lee and Haeran Ryu
- Became the second consecutive Korean player to win the LOTTE Championship presented by Hoakalei, following A Lim Kim in 2024
- Became the sixth sponsor invite to win on the LPGA Tour since 2001, and first since Rose Zhang at the 2023 Mizuho Americans Open
- Became the 26th different winner on the LPGA Tour in 2025 through 25 events

Buick LPGA Shanghai Hoakalei Country Club Purse: \$2.2 million

Winner: Jeeno Thitikul (-24)

- Earns her sixth win on the LPGA Tour and second of the season following the Mizuho Americas
 Open
- Is the first multiple-time winner on the LPGA Tour in 2025
- Earns her first victory as Rolex Rankings No. 1
- Outlasted Minami Katsu in a five-hole playoff

BMW Ladies Championship

Pine Beach Golf Links
Purse: \$2.3 million

Winner: Sei Young Kim (-24)

- Is the 27th different winner in the LPGA Tour's 2025 season, breaking the record for most different winners in a single season in the history of the LPGA Tour
- Is the third wire-to-wire winner this season
- Earns the seventh victory by a player from the Republic of Korea this season, the most of any country this season
- Earns her first win in the Republic of Korea, her home country

Hanwha LIFEPLUS International Crown

New Korea Country Club Purse: \$2.0 million Winner: Australia

- Australia is the fifth different winer of the event
- No country has ever won the event twice
- Minjee Lee won the MVP Award with a record of 4-0-1



 This is the second playing of the event in the Republic of Korea, with the home country winning in 2018

Maybank Championship Kuala Lumpur Golf & Country Club Purse: \$3 million

Winner: Miyu Yamashita (-18)

- Defeated Hannah Green and Hye-Jin Choi on the first playoff hole
- Becomes the Tours second repeat winner of 2025
 - o Joins Jeeno Thitikul as the only other multi-time winner this season
- Ties the second largest come-from-behind win in a 72-hole event since 1980 coming into the final round eight strokes back
 - o Ties three players, last done by Lilia Vu at the 2024 Meijer LPGA Classic for Simply Give
- Eleventh Japanese player to win at least two times on the LPGA Tour
- First rookie to win multiple times in a single season since Thitikul in 2022
- First Japanese player to win twice in a single season since Nasa Hataoka in 2021
