COMPETITION HIGHLIGHTS

- Winner: **Hannah Green** won her second HSBC Women's World Championship with a final round 69
 - Green played all four rounds under par
 - Had three bogeys, four birdies and an eagle in her final round
 - Hit 8/14 fairways, 14/18 greens in regulation and had 30 putts
 - Led the field in eagles through the week with one during her first round and one during her fourth
 - This was her first win with her husband as her caddie
- 2: **Auston Kim** finished solo second after a 5-under-par 67
 - Kim had the lowest round of the day
 - Carded two bogeys, five birdies and an eagle

- Hit 9/14 fairways, 14/18 greens in regulation and had 29 putts
- Tied for second in fewest bogeys made across four rounds recording only six
- Led the field in average driving distance with an average of 286.5 yards over the four rounds
- T3: **Pauline Roussin-Bouchard, Angel Yin** and **Minjee Lee** tied for third at 11-under-par 277
 - Roussin-Bouchard had a final round 68 to rise 5 places
 - Carded seven birdies and three bogeys
 - Hit 8/14 fairways, 14/18 greens and had 28 putts
 - This is her best solo finish on the LPGA Tour (finished T3 with partner **Manon de Roey** at the 2025 Dow Championship)
 - Yin shot a final round 71
 - Carded four birdies and three bogeys
 - Hit 6/14 fairways, 11/18 greens in regulation and had 28 putts
 - Yin was second across the field for most birdies made with 20
 - Lee had an even par final round
 - Made three bogeys and three birdies
 - Hit 5/14 fairways, 6/18 greens in regulation and had only 24 putts
 - This was Lee's first start of the 2026 LPGA Tour season
- Defending champion **Lydia Ko** finished at T27 with a 3-under-par total of 285
- LPGA rookie **Mimi Rhodes** finished T10 with a 6-under-par total of 282

- Earned her seventh career victory and first of 2026
- Became the third two-time winner of the HSBC Women's World Championship, joining **Jin Young Ko** and **Inbee Park**
- Earned her first win since the 2024 BMW Ladies Championship (497 days)
- Surpassed \$500,000 in season official earnings
- Surpassed \$8 million in career official earnings
- Became the third unique winner of the 2026 LPGA Tour season
- Career: Seven wins, 35 career top 10s, 8.1 M in career official earnings
 - Won the 2019 KPMGA Women's PGA Championship for her only major championship win
 - Represented Australia at the 2023 and 2025 Hanwha LIFEPLUS International Crown

- Represented Australia at the 2020 and 2024 Olympics

QUOTABLES

Hannah Green (1, -14) on how this win compares to her 2024 HSBC Women's Championship Win

"I think I'm far more emotional just because I was able to do it with my husband. I felt like, yeah, again, I played good in areas last year but it wasn't very consistent at all, and I guess it has been a long time since I have had a trophy in my hand. When I did win Singapore two years ago, I went on to win two other tournaments that season and pretty much had my best season on tour. So having a win so early in the season gives me a bit more flexibility with the tournaments that I can play. So I'm hoping that this puts me in good stead for the rest of the year."

Auston Kim (2, -13) on what she continues to learn on Tour

"I think there's a lot to learn, whether it's golf-related or just human-related, and I feel like every single day is an opportunity to learn how to become a better golfer, how to become a better human. There's a lot to learn still, but like I said a couple days ago, every second out on the course is a win, and every second out competing is something that I'm extremely grateful for. There's only things to gain, and I gained a lot this week, and I'm pretty proud of it."

Pauline Roussin-Bouchard (T3, -11) on her takeaways from this week

"A lot. I was trying to change my mindset for this week. Last week, was like, you can do better. You can do way better. This week every time I was telling myself that, I was trying to find the positive in every single thing, even though sometimes I'm asking my caddie, can you tell me the positive on this one because I really can't see it. So I'm definitely going to take that dynamic for the rest of the season, and everything has been pretty much the same things. It just lines up really well. Playing good, mentally good, things were lightening up. So I'm glad it turned out to be a really, really about week."

Angel Yin (T3, -11) on how she continues to compete

"I don't know. I guess just liking it and putting in the work because you have to put in the work because you like it. Because it's a lot of effort to be honest. I was a bit struggling since -- I've been struggling since, like, Boston last year. So it's been a while. So to pull myself out of it is pretty cool."

Minjee Lee (T3, -11) on how she appreciates the HSBC Women's World Championship

"I always feel like it's my first or second week to start the year. I'm always really looking forward to getting the year started, and especially being in Singapore and Marina Bay Sands is one of my sponsors, or Sands Group is one of my sponsors. It's always nice to start in Singapore. The tournament's always looked after us so well, so I just love coming back."
