- **Highest purse:** The 156-player field will compete for a \$13 million purse, the highest in women's golf history.

**Tournament History:**

- The KPMG Women's PGA Championship continues the rich tradition of the LPGA Championship as one of five majors in women's golf, along with The Chevron Championship, U.S. Women's Open, The Amundi Evian Championship and the AIG Women's Open.
- The 2026 KPMG Women's PGA Championship marks the 12th year of the impactful collaboration between the PGA of America, KPMG and LPGA.
- The KPMG Women's PGA Championship, offering a purse among the highest in women's golf sets the standard for excellence in women's golf, and one of the tenets of this partnership was that the Championship would be shared with the nation's finest golf courses and communities.
- Since 2015, the KPMG Women's PGA Championship has been staged at historically significant Championship venues such as Westchester/2015, Sahalee/2016 & 2024, Olympia Fields/2017, Kemper Lakes/2018, Hazeltine/2019, Aronimink/2020, Atlanta Athletic Club/2021, Congressional/2022, Baltusrol/2023 and Fields Ranch East at PGA Frisco/2025.
- Beverly Hanson won the inaugural LPGA Championship in 1955 at Orchard Ridge Country Club in Fort Wayne, Indiana, defeating Louise Suggs, 4 and 3, in the championship match. It was the only time the LPGA Championship ended in a match-play finale after the initial three rounds were conducted via stroke play.
- The KPMG Women's PGA Championship has been played 71 times and there have been 49 unique champions.
- Past champions include many of the greatest names in women's golf: Mickey Wright, Betsy Rawls, Kathy Whitworth, Nancy Lopez, Patty Sheehan, Beth Daniel, Betsy King, Juli Inkster, Laura Davies, Annika Sörenstam, Se Ri Pak, Cristie Kerr, Inbee Park, Brooke Henderson, Nelly Korda and Minjee Lee.
