

## **2026 LPGA Tour Storylines**

- The LPGA Tour commemorated its 75th anniversary season throughout 2025, celebrating its legacy as the world's longest-running women's professional sports organization
  - The Tour saw 29 unique winners during the 2025 season, including 11 Rolex First-Time Winners
- The 2026 LPGA Tour schedule features 31 official events in 12 different countries and 13 different states in the U.S.
  - Two new events – the Fortinet Founders Cup and Aramco Championship – are featured in 2026
    - The Fortinet Founders Cup marks the return of the LPGA to California's Bay Area where players will compete at the exclusive Sharon Heights Golf & Country Club
    - The Aramco Championship, co-sanctioned with the LET and Golf Saudi, will take place at Shadow Creek Golf Course in Las Vegas, NV and features a \$4 million purse
  - Players will compete for the largest prize fund in history at more than \$132 million
    - This is more than a 90% increase from 2021
- The 2026 major championship venues include:
  - Memorial Park Golf Course in Houston, Texas (The Chevron Championship)
  - Riviera Country Club in Pacific Palisades, California (U.S. Women's Open)
  - Hazeltine National Golf Club in Chaska, Minnesota (KPMG Women's PGA Championship)
  - Evian Resort Golf Club in Evian-les-Bains, France (Amundi Evian Championship)
  - Royal Lytham & St Annes Golf Club in Lytham St Annes, England, United Kingdom (AIG Women's Open)
- The 20th edition of the Solheim Cup will return in 2026 in September at Bernardus Golf in the Netherlands
  - Three-time major champion and nine-time Solheim Cup veteran Anna Nordqvist will lead the European Solheim Cup Team.
  - Seven-time LPGA Tour winner and six-time Solheim Cup veteran Angela Stanford will captain the U.S. Solheim Cup Team.
  - The Americans will arrive in Europe as the defending champions following their victory at Robert Trent Jones Golf Club in the United States in 2024.
- The schedule includes the fourth annual Grant Thornton Invitational, where the 32-player field comprised of 16 LPGA Tour and 16 PGA TOUR professionals compete for a combined \$4 million purse (\$2 million each Tour)
  - Lauren Coughlin and Andrew Novak won the third edition of the event at Tiburon Golf Club in Naples, Fla.
- There are 28 LPGA Tour rookies in 2026, representing 14 different countries (including the U.S.)
- There are 15 players on the LPGA Tour that earned status for the 2026 season through competing on the Epson Tour in 2025
  - The top-10 finishers (Melanie Green, Yana Wilson, Gina Kim, Sophia Schubert, Erika Hara, Briana Chacon, Riley Smyth, Laetitia Beck, Minji Kang, Hailee Cooper, Anne Chen, Isabella Fierro, Michelle Zhang, Carla Tejedro Mullet, Laney Frye) will serve as 2026 Epson Tour Ambassadors
- The 2026 season features several season-long competitions including:

- [Race to the CME Globe](#): a season-long points competition in which LPGA Members accumulate points in every Official LPGA Tournament to gain entry into the season-ending CME Group Tour Championship, where they will compete for an \$11 million purse
  - The \$4 million winner's check at the CME Group Tour Championship is the largest first-place prize in the history of women's golf
- [Aon Risk Reward Challenge](#): a unique, season-long competition that highlights the game's best players as they navigate some of the most strategically challenging holes
  - The player at the top of the Aon leaderboard at the end of the regular season will receive \$1 million
  - Jennifer Kupcho (2025), Jeeno Thitikul (2024), Angel Yin (2023), Minjee Lee (2022), Hannah Green (2021) and Carlota Ciganda (2019) are past winners of the Aon Risk Reward Challenge
- [Rolex Player of the Year](#): an award given to the player that has the most consistent and outstanding record during the current LPGA Tour season, with points awarded to Members finishing in the top 10 and ties in Official Tournaments
- [Vare Trophy](#): an award given to the player on Tour with the lowest overall scoring average based on the Member's total yearly score in Official Tournaments divided by the number of official rounds she played during a season
- [Louise Suggs Rolex Rookie of the Year](#): an award given to the first-year Member who scores the most points based on finish position at Official Tournaments during a season
- [Rolex Annika Major Award](#): an award given to the player who has the most outstanding record in all five major championships during the LPGA Tour season

### **2026 LPGA Tournament Recaps**

#### **Hilton Grand Vacations Tournament of Champions (Jan. 29 – Feb. 1)**

**Lake Nona Golf & Country Club in Lake Nona, Fla.**

**Purse: \$2.1 million**

**Winner: Nelly Korda (-13)**

- Event was reduced the 54-hole event
- Earned her 16th LPGA Tour win
  - Her first since The ANNIKA driven by Gainbridge at Pelican in 2024 (1 year, 2 months, 15 days)
- The first time she won in a season debut since joining the Tour in 2017
- The first American to win the Hilton Grand Vacations Tournament of Champions since Danielle Kang in 2022
- The second event that both Nelly and Jessica Korda have won
  - Jessica won the Hilton Grand Vacations Tournament of Champions in 2021
  - Jessica also won the 2012 Women's Australian Open and Nelly won the event in 2019

#### **Honda LPGA Thailand (Feb. 19-22)**

**Siam Country Club (Old Course) in Pattaya, Chonburi, Thailand**

**Purse: \$1.8 million**

**Winner: Jeeno Thitikul (-24)**

- Earned her eighth LPGA Tour win and first in home country of Thailand
- Became the third player from Thailand to win this event joining Patty Tavatanakit (2024) and Ariya Jutanugarn (2021)
- This was her third win in five starts (2025 Buick LPGA Shanghai, 2025 CME Group Tour Championship)
- Marks her third consecutive season with a win

**HSBC Women's World Championship (Feb. 26-Mar. 1)****Sentosa Golf Club (Tanjong) in Singapore****Purse: \$3 million****Winner: Hannah Green (-14)**

- Earned her seventh LPGA Tour win
- Became a two-time winner of the HSBC Women's World Championship
  - Won for the first time in 2024
- Became the first Australian to win on Tour this year
- Won with her husband as her caddie for the first time

**Blue Bay LPGA (Mar. 5-8)****Jian Lake Blue Bay Golf Course in China****Purse: \$2.6 million****Winner: Mi Hyang Lee (-11)**

- Earned her third LPGA Tour win
  - First win since 2017 (3,143 days)
- Became the first player from the Republic of Korea to win this year
- Surpassed \$6M in career earnings with her win
- Two of her three wins have come in Asia
- Became the second player from the Republic of Korea to win the Blue Bay LPGA

**Fortinet Founders Cup (Mar. 19-22)****Sharon Heights Golf & Country Club in Menlo Park, California****Purse: \$3 million****Winner: Hyo Joo Kim (-16)**

- Earned her eighth LPGA Tour win
- Became a two-time Fortinet Founders Cup champion
  - Won during her rookie season in 2015
- Won wire-to-wire
- Became the eighth player from the Republic of Korea to win eight or more times on the LPGA Tour

**Ford Championship presented by Wild Horse Pass (Mar. 26-29)****Whirlwind Golf Club, Cattail Course in Phoenix, Arizona****Purse: \$2.25 million****Winner: Hyo Joo Kim (-28)**

- Earned her ninth LPGA Tour win
- Won in back-to-back weeks

- Defended her title at the Ford Championship
  - Won in 2025
- Set her 72-hole career scoring record at 260
- Became the first player from the Republic of Korea with multiple wins in one season since **Jin Young Ko** in 2023

**Aramco Championship (Apr. 2-5)****Shadow Creek Golf Course in Las Vegas, Nevada****Purse: \$4 million****Winner: Lauren Coughlin (-7)**

- Earned her third career victory on Tour and first since 2024
- Her first wire-to-wire victory on the LPGA Tour
  - Fifth American over the last 10 seasons to win wire-to-wire
- Fourth player since 2000 to win at least three times in their 30s after claiming their first win in their 30s
- Set the 36, 54 and 72-hole tournament scoring records at Shadow Creek

**JM Eagle LA Championship presented by Plastpro (Apr. 16-19)****El Caballero Country Club in Los Angeles, California****Purse: \$4.75 million****Winner: Hannah Green (-17)**

- Earned her second victory of the LPGA Tour season
- Green defeated Sei Young Kim and Jin Hee Im with a birdie on the first playoff hole
- Became the first three-time winner of this event
- Walter Wang (CEO of JM Eagle) raised the purse by \$1 million during the third round

**The Chevron Championship (Apr. 23-26)****Memorial Park Golf Course in Houston, Texas****Purse: \$9 million****Champion: Nelly Korda (-18)**

- Earned her 17th LPGA Tour victory and third major championship
- The first player since **Amy Alcott** at The Chevron Championship in 1991 to win a major championship wire-to-wire after leading by multiple shots after each round
- Becomes the third player to start an LPGA Tour season with five or more consecutive starts of T2 or better including **Karrie Webb** in 2000 (5 starts) and **Annika Sorenstam** in 2001 (6 starts)
- Becomes the sixth American player to win a third major championship before the age of 28 joining **Patty Berg, Louise Suggs, Betsy Rawls, Mickey Wright, Kathy Whitworth** and **Amy Alcott**
- Becomes the eighth different player to win The Chevron Championship two or more times

**Mexico Riviera Maya Open at Mayakoba (Apr. 30 – May 3)****El Camaleón Golf Course at Mayakoba in Playa del Carmen, Quintana Roo, Mexico****Purse: \$2.5 million****Winner: Nelly Korda (-17)**

- Earns her 18th LPGA Tour win

- Earns her 23rd point toward the LPGA Hall of Fame
- Claims her third win of the 2026 season
- Earned back-to-back victories
- Her third season on the LPGA Tour with three or more victories (2021, four wins; 2024, seven wins)
- Her first win since she returned to No. 1 in the Rolex Women's World Golf Rankings
- First American to win in Mexico since **Christina Kim** won at the 2014 Citibanmex Lorena Ochoa Invitational presented by Aeromexico and Delta

**Mizuho Americas Open (May 7-10)****Mountain Ridge Country Club in West Caldwell, New Jersey****Purse: \$3.25 million****Winner: Jeeno Thitikul (-13)**

- Earned her ninth LPGA Tour win
- Defended her title at the Mizuho Americas Open
- Claimed her second win of the 2026 season
- Became the fourth multi-time winner this season
- Surpassed \$18 million in career official earnings

**Kroger Queen City Championship presented by P&G (May 14-17)****Maketewah Country Club in Cincinnati, Ohio****Purse: \$2 million****Winner: Lottie Woad (-12)**

- Earned her second LPGA Tour win in her 19th start
  - Fastest to two wins since Sung Hyun Park in 2017 (16 starts)
- First European to win this season
- Seventh Englishwomen to win at least two times on the LPGA Tour
- Seventh unique winner of the 2026 season

**ShopRite LPGA powered by Wakefern (May 29-31)****Seaview, A Dolce Hotel, Bay Course in Galloway, New Jersey****Purse: \$2 million****Winner: Celine Boutier (-9)**

- Won for the first time since the 2023 Maybank Championship (945 days)
- Overcame a four stroke deficit heading into the final round
- Became the sixth multi-time winner of this event
- Eighth unique winner of the 2026 season

**U.S. Women's Open presented by Ally (June 4-7)****Riviera Country Club in Pacific Palisades, California****Purse: \$12.5 million****Champion: Nelly Korda (-8)**

- Won her fourth major championship victory and 19th LPGA Tour win
- Became the third player actively ranked No. 1 in the Rolex Women's World Golf Rankings to win the U.S. Women's Open (Annika Sorenstam, 2006; Inbee Park, 2013)

- Became the fourth player to win multiple major championships while actively ranked World No. 1 (Inbee Park, 3; Yani Tseng, 2; Lorena Ochoa, 2)
- Became the first player to win first 2 majors of season since 2013 (Inbee Park)
- Became the first American to win first 2 majors of season since 1986 (Pat Bradley)
- Became the first player to win Chevron and U.S. Women's Open in same season since 2013 (Inbee Park)
- Became the first American to win Chevron and U.S. Women's Open in same season since 1990 (Betsy King)
- Became the youngest American player to win 4 major championships since Mickey Wright in 1960
- Became the first American to win the U.S. Women's Open since Allisen Corpuz in 2023

**Dow Championship (Jun 11-14)**

**Midland Country Club in Midland, Michigan**

**Purse: \$3.3 million**

**Winners: Gina Kim and Yana Wilson (-17)**

- Both Kim and Wilson became Rolex First Time Winners and the first of 2026
- Wilson became the youngest player to win on Tour since **Chanettee Wannasaen** at the 2023 Standard Portland Classic
- Wilson became the first rookie winner of the 2026 LPGA Tour season
- The latest the Tour had gone without a Rolex First Time Winner since **Danielle Kang** in July 2017

**Meijer LPGA Classic for Simply Give (June 18-21)**

**Blythefield Country Club in Belmont, Michigan**

**Purse: \$3.25 million**

**Winner: Miyu Yamashita (-17)**

- Defeated Lottie Woad on the first playoff hole
- Earned her third career victory
  - Is the sixth player from Japan to win at least three times on the LPGA Tour
  - Is the fastest Japanese player to three wins, 37 starts
  - **Nasa Hataoka** previously held that mark with three wins in 47 starts
- Earned her sixth top 10 of the season
  - Has 18 top 10s in her first two seasons so far, 37 starts
  - Became the seventh fastest player to 18 top 10s since 2000 passing **Lorena Ochoa**
- Shot 8-under in the final round to put herself in contention

**KPMG Women's PGA Championship (June 25-28)**

**Hazeltine National Golf Club in Chaska, Minnesota**

**Purse: \$13 million**

**Champion: Haeran Ryu (-13)**

- Won her first major championship
- Defeated **Ina Yoon** by two shots
- Is the 21st player from the Republic of Korea to win a major championship
- Has a win in each of her first four seasons on the LPGA Tour

- Is the first player since **Jin Young Ko** (2017-2020) to win at least once in their first four seasons on the LPGA Tour
- Is the third player from the Republic of Korea to win on Tour this season, joining **Mi Hyang Lee** (Blue Bay LPGA) and **Hyo Joo Kim** (Fortinet Founders Cup, Ford Championship)
- Is the sixth different player from the Republic of Korea to win this event since 2015

**The Amundi Evian Championship (July 9-12)**

**Evian Resort Golf Club in Evian-les-Bains, France**

**Purse: \$9.1 million**

**Champion: Haeran Ryu (-19)**

- Defeated **Brooke Henderson** on the first playoff hole
- Won her second major championship this season and of her career
  - Joined **Nelly Korda** as the only other major champion this season
- Earned her fifth career victory
- Is the third player from the Republic of Korea to win at least two major championships in a single season since The Amundi Evian Championship was elevated to a major championship in 2013
- Is the first player from the Republic of Korea to win two major championships in a single season since **Jin Young Ko** in 2019
- Is the eighth player from Korea to win at least two major championships

**ISPS HANDA Women's Scottish Open (July 23-26)**

**Dundonald Links in Gaires, North Ayrshire, Scotland**

**Purse: \$2 million**

**Winner: Jenny Shin (-9)**

- Her second LPGA Tour win, with her first coming at the 2016 Ascendant LPGA benefiting Volunteers of America
- Her first win in 10 years, 2 months and 25 days
  - The third time since 1980 that an LPGA player went 10 or more years between official wins
  - The last LPGA player to go 10 or more years between official victories was **Vicki Fergon**, who went 12 years, 3 months and 6 days between victories at the 1984 S&H Golf Classic and the 1996 Michelob Light Heartland Classic
- The second wire-to-wire winner this season joining **Nelly Korda** at The Chevron Championship

**AIG Women's Open (July 30-Aug. 2)**

**Royal Lytham & St Annes Golf Club in Lytham St Annes, Lancashire, England**

**Purse: \$10 million**

**Champion: Shiho Kuwaki (-5)**

- Won after making a par on the second playoff hole over Esther Henseleit
- Her first victory on the LPGA Tour; deferred Membership until 2027
- Became the first non-member to win a major championship since **Yuka Saso** at the 2021 U.S. Women's Open
- Became the first non-member to win on the LPGA Tour since **Yumin Hwang** at the 2025 LOTTE Championship presented by Hoakalei

- Became the seventh player from Japan to win a major championship on the LPGA Tour

**The Standard Portland Classic (Aug. 13-16)**

**Columbia Edgewater Country Club in Portland, Oregon**

**Purse: \$2 million**

**Winner: Jeeno Thitikul (-22)**

- Won by one stroke over **Arpichaya Yubol**
- Earned her 10th LPGA Tour win
- Claimed her third victory of 2026
- First player since Nelly Korda to win at least 10 times on Tour
- Second consecutive season she has recorded at least three victories

**CPKC Women's Open (Aug. 20-23)**

**Royal Mayfair Golf Club in Edmonton, Alberta, Canada**

**Purse: \$2.75 million**

**Winner: Miyu Yamashita (-23)**

- Tied the 54-hole and 72-hole LPGA Tour scoring records
- Broke the 36-hole, 54-hole and 72-hole CPKC Women's Open scoring records
- Won by nine strokes, the most since Sei Young Kim won by eight at the 2018 Thornberry Creek LPGA Classic
- Became the fastest Japanese player to reach four wins

**FM Championship (Aug.27-30)**

**TPC Boston in Norton, Massachusetts**

**Purse: \$4.4 million**

**Winner: Ruoning Yin (-14)**

- Earns her sixth career victory
- Went for the par-5 18th green in two; birdied the last hole to finish two shots ahead of Hyo Joo Kim
- Claims the first win since the 2024 Maybank Championship (672 days)
- Just the sixth player in the last 15 years to have six LPGA Tour wins including a major championship before the age of 24; would be the first to do so since Nelly Korda

**Solheim Cup (Sept. 11-13)**

**Bernardus Golf in Den Bosch, Cromvoirt, Netherlands**

**Winning Team: Europe**

- Seventh time that the Solheim Cup was tied entering the final session
  - In all seven instances, the home team either won or retained the cup
- Carlota Ciganda earned the clinching point, the second time in her career
  - She clinched the cup for Europe in 2023
  - She is the second player to earn the decisive point joining Catriona Matthew
- Alison Lee had the largest comeback on record having won her singles match after being four down
- Anna Nordqvist's four captain's picks combined to produce a record of 8-4-1 which was the best record by a collection of European Team Captain's picks since 2013
